

# Walt Disney's-Disneyland Transfer Train

In the toy and train industry since the beginning of toy collecting, as most of us know it, Disney toys and trains have been among the most desired by collectors and will remain so unless something drastic happens. This "Transfer Train" was made in "The British Crown Colony of Hong Kong" and was purchased in England. The date of manufacture was 1971 and this particular Disney piece is in a lively colored box and the toy is plastic with a green base, a pink track, a blue "transfer" light and two yellow trains.

The trains circle the track and as Pluto is transferred onto the station platform Donald is boarding the train at the other end. This set has one too many figures and two Mickey Mouses may explain that one. Besides two Mickeys, Donald Duck and Pluto, this set contains Pinnochio, Minnie Mouse, Goofy and Jiminey Cricket. The set runs on two batteries and gives many hours of playtime fun. Toys like this one are hard to find in their original condition which may lead to their desirability.



What does the new MARX train collectors have? A generally disregarded and ignored specialty car is the old time photography car. In the late 1800's and early 1900's, as towns grew up by the railroad tracks, there were few non-essential services available. One of these would have been the photographers shop where the family portrait could be taken. In the past, photographers out-fitted coaches, parlor cars and cabooses as studios, complete with dark rooms, backdrop scenes, furniture and lighting. These fancy rolling studios were pulled into a town, set on a siding and the entire country side and town came to have their pictures taken. When the business started to end, the train car would be hooked up to a passing train and taken to the next town.

As MARX collectors search thru the antique shops and flea markets for MARX items an associated artifact would be these old pictures. These pictures are generally sepia colored, fairly large and mounted on card board. They are usually identified as "Photo Car", Railroad Photo Studio, Palace car or some other identification as a railroad car. Most of them are interesting as they depict the dress, styles, furniture and habits of the era of the railroad empire builders.

In 1995 the TCA commissioned the new MARX train company to produce a Union Pacific RR Photography car as a convention car. Probably, the UPRR actually used a photography car to produce the large number of scenic railroad pictures for souveniers, calenders, time tables and advertising. It's an interesting car that is a convention piece on a tin plate layout or display.







A friend of mine found this ad for MARX trains in an automotive supply catalog. I found the Army train to be a very neat item with the contents. I can't find any info on this item. I'm wondering what the engine is? I figure it may be a 897. The ad was from 1941 and states first time reversable windup. My books show me the 897 from 1940 with a reversible motor. The picture doesn't show any lithograph but it has the same configuration as the 897. The army barracks looks to me like the set box and the soldiers look like the small metal ones with numbers on the bottom. I just thought this might be an interesting picture to put in Collecting With MARX. About the only thing I have found lately is a British M10000. It is maroon and silver. I purchased it at the St. Charles (Illinois) toy show from a bentleman from England. It consisted of the engine, coach and coach buffet. It's in pretty nice condition. 


In issue 29 you have a nice article about MARX civilian and military planes. I assume civilian means holes for windows and canopy for military. You ask about a civilian olive drab plane because you have never seen one. Back in issue 20 I wrote and asked if clips under the wings were to carry a bomb load. You said they were and they carried wooden bombs. Here is a picture of my plane. It is a civilian olive drab plane and it has the clips for the bombs. I bought it in an antique mall but it didn't come on the flat car. The silver bombs under the wings are repro, but everything else is original.

I have a yellow and brown M10005 wind-up diesel power engine. It has the tab and slot freight coupler factory rivited on the back instead of the pin for the articulated sets or the dog bone coupler. It looks like the (732 GMD) electric, white and green with freight coupler. Greenbergs price guide does not mention it or give it a number. I know there are other things missing in the price guide too, but wonder how rare or common this piece is and what number it may be. Have you seen this one, or know the number, or how rare or common it may be? What is the value of the diesel? I've only seen one other in someone elses collection and he doesn't know either.

In June I went to the great midwest train show in Chicago area and seen a very good 5 piece Mickey Mouse Meteor for \$1200. To rich for me, so all I could do was drool! Stopped at a few antique malls on the way back to Green Bay and found another 5 piece set for \$400. Just as nice. I now own a Mickey Mouse Meteor! You seldom see one for sale and then see two in the same day!

Sometime could you write about the flat tin litho MARX soldiers. How many different kinds, what they are, which are harder to find, and values. I've been trying to collect them to display with my military trains but have little to go by. I don't know which I'm missing or if I'm paying to much. --Jerry Wixon.


